The Indian Ocean Tsunami of 2004





On December 26, 2004, a massive undersea earthquake struck off the coast of Sumatra, Indonesia. Measuring between 9.1 and 9.3 on the Richter scale, it was one of the most powerful earthquakes ever recorded. Within minutes, it triggered a devastating tsunami that affected 14 countries and killed more than 230,000 people, making it one of the deadliest natural disasters in history.

What Caused the Tsunami?

The earthquake occurred along the Sunda Trench, where the Indian plate is slowly sliding beneath the Burma plate. The sudden upward movement of the sea floor displaced a vast amount of water, creating a series of giant waves that traveled across the Indian Ocean at speeds up to 800 km/h.

In some places, the tsunami reached coastal areas within 15–30 minutes of the quake. In others, like Sri Lanka and India, it arrived several hours later—but there were no warning systems in place to alert people.

Countries Affected

Indonesia was hit the hardest, especially the Aceh province, where over 160,000 people died. Sri Lanka and India lost tens of thousands of lives and saw massive destruction. Thailand, known for its tourist areas, suffered thousands of deaths, including many foreigners. Countries as far away as Somalia and Kenya also experienced deadly waves. Entire villages were swept away. Homes, schools, hospitals, and roads were destroyed. Millions of people were left homeless and without basic needs.

The Global Response

The scale of the disaster prompted an enormous international response. Governments, NGOs, and individuals donated billions of dollars. Emergency teams were sent to provide food, clean water, shelter, and medical care. The disaster also led to long-term rebuilding projects in affected regions.

A major outcome of the tragedy was the creation of the Indian Ocean Tsunami Warning System, which was set up in 2006. It helps detect undersea earthquakes and alert coastal populations of potential tsunamis.


A Day Of A Kitten

As she's afraid to lift her paw off the floor


She has her lunch

On her owner's lap


As the moon rises up and high Her head lifts up to gaze at the sky Her ears are low and eyes are dead As her whole body is ready for bed





